School-based apprenticeships & traineeships...

- » allows students to gain on-the-job experience, working towards a nationally recognised qualification in a trade or occupation
- » students start in year 10, 11 or 12 and are paid
- » school-based apprenticeships often continue as full-time apprenticeships once the student has finished their schooling. Traineeships usually finish while at school

Work experience

- » gives students a feel for a particular industry or workplace
- » students must be at least 14 years old
- » students can participate in work experience for up to 30 days in a calendar year
- » students are not paid
- » may lead to a school-based apprenticeship or traineeship

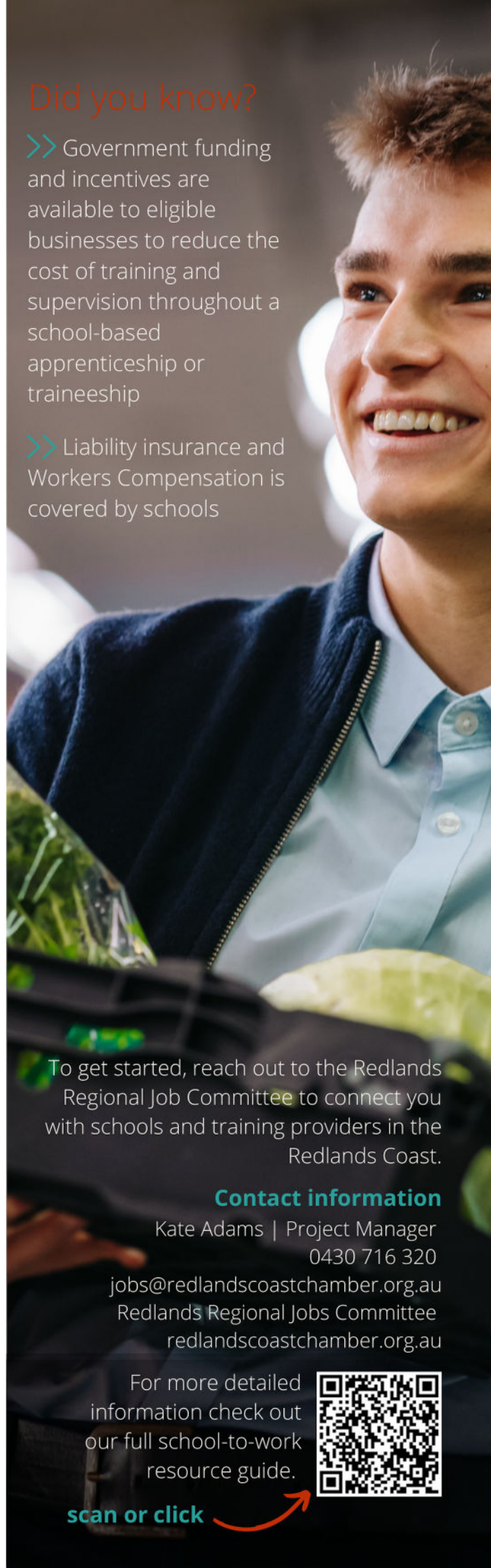
Work placement

- » available for Year 11 & 12 students, studying a vocational subject in a specific industry
- » students have compulsory assessment(s) during their placement
- » students are not paid during work placement as they are classified as a “voluntary worker”



Did you know?

- » Government funding and incentives are available to eligible businesses to reduce the cost of training and supervision throughout a school-based apprenticeship or traineeship
- » Liability insurance and Workers Compensation is covered by schools
